#### Compatriots,



As it turned out they did us a favor, we had our own Festival at our Plaza and had a great crowd of visitors. As someone told me, we gained a lot of respect and received more publicity than being in the parade. Gary Williams and Gary Bray set up tables and displayed Civil War relics which drew visitors to the event. I would like to thank all the members that were at the Plaza that day to help out.

Thanks to Doug Smith for going before the Palestine Zoning Board, we did get approval to put up our entrance sign 2 feet back from the property line instead of 10 feet.

The Executive Committee met and voted on two more granite monuments for the end of the sidewalks. One is a quote from General Pat Cleburne, and the other is the" Charge" from Gen. S. D. Lee. The monument with a quote from President Jefferson Davis has been installed. We have also acquired an 18 piece brass band to play period music during the Parade and at the Plaza on April 13. It will be a grand day in DIXIE on April 13<sup>th</sup>. I look forward to seeing everyone there.

The **First Battle of Bull Run**, also known as **First Manassas** (the name used by Confederate forces), was fought on July 21, 1861, in <u>Prince William County</u>, <u>Virginia</u>, near the city of <u>Manassas</u>. It was the first major land battle of the <u>American Civil War</u>. Just months after the start of the war at <u>Fort Sumter</u>, the <u>Northern</u> public clamored for a march against the <u>Confederate</u> capital of <u>Richmond</u>, <u>Virginia</u>, which they expected to bring an early end to the rebellion. Yielding to political pressure, <u>Brig. Gen. Irvin McDowell</u> led his unseasoned <u>Union Army</u> across <u>Bull Run</u> against the equally inexperienced Confederate Army of Brig. Gen. <u>P. G. T. Beauregard</u> camped near Manassas Junction. McDowell's ambitious plan for a surprise flank attack on the Confederate left was poorly executed by his officers and men; nevertheless, the Confederates, who had been planning to attack the Union left flank, found themselves at an initial disadvantage.

Confederate reinforcements under Brig. Gen. Joseph E. Johnston arrived from the <u>Shenandoah Valley</u> by railroad and the course of the battle quickly changed. A <u>brigade of Virginians</u> under a relatively unknown colonel from the <u>Virginia Military Institute</u>, <u>Thomas J.</u> Jackson, stood their ground and Jackson received his famous nickname, "Stonewall Jackson". The Confederates then launched a strong counterattack, and as the Union troops began withdrawing under fire, many panicked and it turned into a <u>rout</u> as McDowell's men frantically ran without order in the direction of <u>Washington, D.C.</u> Both armies were sobered by the fierce fighting and many casualties, and realized the war was going to be much longer and bloodier than either had anticipated. 



The preservation of liberty and freedom was the motivating factor in the South's decision to fight the *Second American Revolution*. The tenacity with which Confederate soldiers fought underscored their belief in the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. These attributes are the underpinning of our democratic society and

represent the foundation on which this nation was built. Today, the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is preserving the history and legacy of these heroes, so future generations can understand the motives that animated the Southern Cause.

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans, and the oldest hereditary organization for male descendants of Confederate soldiers. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved.

Membership in the **Sons of Confederate Veterans** is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either **lineal or collateral** family lines and kinship to a veteran must be **documented genealogically**. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership. **Friends of the SCV** memberships are available as well to those who are committed to upholding our charge, but do not have the
